



THE CARNAHAN LIBRARY

Dedicated on 11/1/09 to the memory of Thomas Dorrington Carnahan II, Thomas Dorrington Carnahan III, George Kirk Carnahan and to the glory of God.

The Carnahan Library is in Room 308, the first room on the right as you enter the third-floor hallway from the elevator. The card catalog will help you to locate a book by author, title, or subject. The Library Committee thanks the donors of the Library books. *Indicates a new book.

*Cradles of the Reich by Jennifer Coburn was purchased by Helen Haines in honor of Barbara Knight for her many years of dedicated leadership of the Carnahan Library. At Heim Hochland, a Nazi breeding home in Bayaria, three women's fates are intertwined. Gundi is a pregnant student from Berlin. An Aryan beauty, she is secretly a member of a resistance group. Hilde, only eighteen, is a true believer in body of wealthy landowner Jimmy Quinn is found floating in the the cause and is thrilled to carry a Nazi official's child. Irma, a fortyyear-old nurse, is desperate to build a new life for herself after personal devastation. This novel is based on the Lebensborn Society maternity homes that actually existed during World War II when thousands of "racially fit" babies were bred and taken from their mothers to be raised as part of the new Germany.

*Wake Up with Purpose! What I've Learned in My First Hundred **Years** by Sister Jean Delores Schmidt with Seth Davis was donated by Barbara Knight in memory of Connie Hornickel, who always woke up with purpose! This part memoir and part spiritual guide was written when Sister Jean was 103-years-young. She became famous as the team chaplain for the Loyola men's basketball team when they went on as a wife and mother to son Asher is upended when her brilliant a Cinderella run to the Final Four in 2018. Her aim for this book was not only to tell the story of her life but also to help others learn, grow, serve God, and serve one another. She wants people to wake up happy as she does and to wake up with purpose.

*Tom Lake by Ann Patachett was purchased by Helen Haines in memory of **Barbara Richmond**. In the spring of 2020, Lara's three daughters return to the family's orchard in northern Michigan. While picking cherries, they beg their mother to tell them the story of Peter Duke, a famous actor with whom she shared both a stage and a romance years before at a theater company called Tom Lake. As Lara recalls the past, her daughters examine their own lives and their relationship with their mother. Tom Lake is a story about young love, married love, and the lives our parents led before they were our parents. Lilia by Linda Ganzini was donated by Barbara Knight and dedicated story follows three generations of a family that suffers a peculiar afflicto the people of Italy who suffered and sacrificed during World War II when Mussolini was their dictator. Linda Grazini writes of her mother, Kerala, water is everywhere. At the turn of the century, a twelve-year-Livia, coming of age amidst the turmoil of her family caught in the crosshairs of the partisan/fascist conflict. Lilia's tender heart is broken by betrayals, the bloodshed of war, and by a mother irreparably broken by loss. But Lilia refuses to succumb and fiercely clings to her dreams of finding happiness.

The following four books were purchased with Library funds. *The Heaven & Earth Grocery Store by James McBride. In 1972, when workers in Pottstown, Pennsylvania were digging the foundations for a new housing development, the last thing they expected to uncover was a human skeleton. Who the skeleton was and how it got buried there are just two of the long-held secrets that had been kept for decades by the residents of Chicken Hill. This is the dilapidated neighborhood where immigrant Jews and African Americans lived side by side, sharing ambitions and sorrows. Chicken Hill was where Moshe and Chona Ludlow lived when Chona ran the Heaven & Earth Grocery Store. When the state came looking for a deaf black child, claiming that the child should be institutionalized, Chicken Hill's residents - roused by Chona's kindness and the courage of a local

black worker named Nate Timblin — bonded together to keep the boy

*The River We Remember by William Kent Krueger. On Memorial Day, 1958, as the people of Jewel, Minnesota gather to remember and honor the sacrifice of so many sons in wars of the past, the half-clothed Alabaster River. Investigation of his death falls to Sheriff Brody Dern, a highly decorated war hero who still carries the physical and emotional scars from his military service. Even before Dern has the autopsy results, vicious rumors begin to circulate that the killer must be Noah Bluestone, a Native American WWII veteran who has recently returned to Jewel with a Japanese wife. As suspicions and accusations mount and the town teeters on the edge of more violence, Dern struggles not only to find the truth of Quinn's murder but also to put to rest the demons from his own past.

*Mad Honey by Jodi Picoult and Jennifer Finney Boylan. Olivia McAfee knows what it feels like to start over. Her picture-perfect life surgeon husband revealed a darker side. She never imagined that she would end up living back in the house she grew up in and taking over her father's beekeeping business. Lily Campanello is familiar with do-overs too. She and her mom relocated to Adams, New Hampshire hoping for a fresh start. Ash falls for the new girl in school and Lily can't help but fall for him too. Then one day, Olivia receives a phone call: Lily is dead, and Asher is being questioned by the police. Olivia is adamant that Asher is innocent. But she would be lying if she didn't acknowledge the flashes of his father's temper in Ash. As the case against him unfolds, she realizes he's hidden more than he's shared

*The Covenant of Water by Abraham Verghese. Spanning the years 1900 to 1977, this novel is set in Kerala, on India's Malabar Coast. The tion: in every generation, at least one person dies by drowning — and in old Christian girl, grieving the death of her father, is sent by boat to her wedding, where she will meet her forty-year-old husband for the first time. From this unforgettable new beginning, the young girl and future matriarch, Big Ammachi, will witness unthinkable changes over the span of her extraordinary life, full of joy and triumph as well as hardship and loss, with her faith and love being the only constants. **Love Story** by Karen Kingsbury was anonymously donated and is part of the Baxter Family Series. From the day they met, John and Elizabeth were destined to fall in love. Their whirlwind romance started when they were young college students and lasted nearly thirty years until Elizabeth died of cancer. When John Baxter is asked to relive his long-ago love story with Elizabeth for his grandson Cole's heritage project, he is not sure that he can do it. The sadness might be too great. But he agrees and allows his heart and soul to go places it has not gone in decades. Whether you are meeting the Baxter Family for the first time or finding them all over again, Love Story will stir your heart and remind you of the generational impact of love and the eternal bond of family.

NEW CITY OF WASHINGTON POLICE CHIEF

What a joy it is in The Church of the Covenant that members of our church family are so involved in our Washington community. So, we celebrate with Steve Devenney, who was appointed the new Chief of the Washington Police department. He was sworn in on January 2, 2024. Steve, we feel safe in your hands, at church and at home.

GRANT AWARDED TO HANDS AND HEARTS

WOMEN, (Women Organized to Mentor, Empower and Network), of Southwestern Pennsylvania, Inc., awarded grants to 35 local non-profit organizations. The guidelines for these grants state the money is to be used only for women and children in need. One of the organizations recognized with a grant was The Church of the Covenant's Hands and Hearts group.

With the grant money, Hands and Hearts (H & H) provided help for local people in need. They funded scholarships for three kids to go to Pine Springs Camp, supplied new underwear for 12 children for the start of the school year and gave brand-new, warm winter pajamas for a family's six children, as well as buying supplies for ongoing women/children programs.

Hands and Hearts' continuing projects include "Love In a Basket," a ministry that provides items for new babies and their mothers, distributing Prayer Shawls (made by Knitting/Sewing Angels), and Teddy Bears and puzzle books to hospitalized or homebound church members. H & H gave gift bags for the church's homebound members for Easter and Christmas, stocked the Commons rack with Care Notes, which are pamphlets that can help us cope with grief or other life events, and coordinated the Blue Christmas service in December.

Hands and Hearts purchases greeting cards as group members receive coupons or find sales. In the past year, the Card Ministry sent greeting cards, each one personalized with a note and an appropriate Bible verse, to over 450 church and community members.

Hands and Hearts also provides educational programs, including CPR, Elder Law and Diabetes Education, offered by professionals in those fields.

Church members who have temporary need for medical equipment like walkers or wheelchairs can benefit from the Hands and Hearts loan-out program, through the Parish Nurse.

Hands and Hearts members are Mary Wichterman, Linda Grimm, Pat Boyer, Gay Lynn Miller and Sarah Losko. If any of the activities of Hands and Hearts sounds like something you would like to help with, they welcome new members.

COMMUNITY CIRCLE FOOD PANTRY

In the Commons is a tub for items to be donated to the Community Circle Food Pantry. The most needed items change monthly due to the availability of what the Greater Pittsburgh food bank has delivered. Peanut Butter is one of the most requested items. The generic list would also include Jelly, Mac'n cheese, Corn, Green Beans, Spaghetti Sauce and Spaghetti Noodles.

There has been an increase in families coming to the pantry, with a lot of them utilizing us now on a weekly basis to meet their food insecurities.

Community Circle Food Pantry is open every Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday 9 a.m. till noon and is located at 70 E. Beau Street, Washington, with the entrance in the alley behind the First Methodist Church.
